Background: Called the "invisible

disability," fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASD) is a permanent, brain-based disability that has often gone undiagnosed.

Lifelong effects from FASD include: disrupted schooling, substance misuse, mental health problems, and involvement with law enforcement. Studies have shown that 1 in 20 children may be affected.
