

North Country Health Consortium Wellness and Recovery Model

Community and Family Education

- NCHC to educate community members, individuals, and families about:
 - Understanding referral processes, treatment options, and best-practices for recovery
 - Preparing to enter treatment
 - Understanding addiction and Substance/Opioid Use Disorder (SUD/OUD)
 - Stigma training to reduce access barriers
- Develop resources for dissemination to increase awareness of referral pathways, a basic understanding of treatment options, and local providers and their functions.
- Provide community education sessions to reach individuals at-risk for overdose or who are using substances to increase outreach and engagement into treatment

Warm Hand-off Model for Emergency Departments

- NCHC to work with Critical Access Hospital Emergency Departments to develop systems for integrating the evidence-based assessment and referral warm hand-off model for individuals presenting with SUD/OUD
- NCHC LADC and Community Health
 Worker/Recovery Coaches (CHW) to provide
 necessary assessment and intervention with
 individual and provide supports to enter
 treatment, as appropriate
- Identify two emergency treatment beds at NCHC's Friendship House for access when needed
- NCHC CHWs and LADC to provide ongoing support for individuals to address unique needs to achieve the best possible outcome

Professional Training and Education

- NCHC to develop education plans to increase awareness of intervention model, local treatment and recovery resources, and best-practices for working with individuals who have SUD/OUD
- NCHC to educate law enforcement in:
 - Understanding treatment options and referral pathways
 - Understanding of addiction and bestpractices for encounters with individuals who have SUD/OUD
- NCHC to educate Emergency Department professionals in:
 - Initial screening and treatment bestpractices
 - The LADC and CHW's role in warm hand-off model
 - Motivational Interviewing
 - Mental Health First Aid
 - Integration of LADC and CHW into ED workflow
 - Providing family support and education

NCHC has also received a one-year, Rural Communities Opioid Response Program Planning Grant to achieve the following:

GOAL: To design an effective, accessible, coordinated system of service delivery that reduces morbidity and mortality associated with opioid overdoses in Northern New Hampshire **Outcome #1:** Improved understanding of accessible treatment and recovery options, gaps in services, and feasibility of systematically increasing capacity and care coordination **Outcome #2:** Implement an Opioid Use Disorder Learning Collaborative that enhances cross-sector community partnerships and explores new, innovative, evidence-based models of care

Outcome #3: Integrated model of care that utilizes a comprehensive approach to address overdose reduction, treatment and recovery support, and criminal justice reforms
